





## **BACKGROUND**

The impact of climate change is too evident in Africa to ignore, from the sweltering heat and destructive floods to persistent droughts and subpar agricultural harvests. Despite the fact that young people, especially in Africa, are sensitive to climate change, political mobilisation is highly challenging.

An identified challenge within the climate change mitigation and adaptation space is Climate Education. To achieve this, need an all-hands-on-deck approach. To broaden participation within the scope of Climate Change, it is imperative to communicate the challenge in a language that is best understood by all. This has been one of the key priorities of the Working group!

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### **PROJECT NAME**

#### **SYNOPSIS**

**Guiding Green Growth Africa** Summit

This initiative seeks to promote a call to action on climate change among African students and youth. The summit aligns with SDG 13 (climate action) and its target 13.1 and 13.3 as well as AU Aspiration 1 focused on a prosperous Africa based on Inclusive Growth and Sustainable Development. The G3 Africa Summit supports good natural resource and environmental governance by promoting awareness, transparency, and citizen engagement in climate action. contributing to responsible and participatory decision-making. The Summit is a blend of panel discussions, training sessions, seminars, and storytelling contests on indigenous knowledge to out to young people for environment and natural resource conservation. Each year, the Guiding Green Growth Africa Summit takes on special topics to be addressed as themes. Currently, this year's theme focuses on exploring indigenous knowledge in climate action.

**AASU Memorial Tree Planting** 

This project is a bold footprint mapping and commemorating fallen 'students in the various national struggles like the Soweto Uprising, the Rwandan Genocide, etc. with memorial trees which would be planted within key locations where these struggles took place. Dotted across the continent of Africa are stories numerous struggles involving young ones of school going age. A rough research has provided the budding probability of this project to plant up to 500,000 memorial trees across the continent. Subsequently, the potential of the over 170 million students we represent can be harnessed in this approach to push for the 1 student 1 tree movement continent-wide. The project needs the requisite support from donors and partner agencies for the optimum output which can be a major change factor in our continental climate mitigation fight.

Climate Education for All This project is in joint partnership with the All African Universities (AAU), Gaia Education and the SDG Centre for Africa. A number of other African institutions. including the African Union Commission and the Africa Capacity Building Foundation will be associated. The African Regional Network of Centres of Excellence on Education for Sustainability will also be encouraged to participate fully in this initiative. The Goal is that by the end of 2023 every single African undergraduate student will have followed online courses on Climate Change and the SDGs, designed by African university Champions and Pioneers who have specialised expertise in these areas. The expectation is that through their participation in these courses, every single African student, irrespective of their subject specialisation will be empowered to become a champion for climate change. Through these online courses they will be encouraged to make life choices for themselves, their families, and the communities around them that will be positive for their own environment and the African continent.

AASU as part of its contribution towards the fight against climate change, has instituted the Eco-Students Ambassadors program which seeks to appoint focal persons who would lead the charge on environment and climate change issues in the various institutions. In the long run we seek to establish green offices on these campuses to deepen the impact and make more visible the works being done by these Eco-Ambassadors.
